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A concept created by Fredric Jameson to articulate the implicit political dimension of creative works. First proposed in The Political Unconscious: Narrative as a Socially Symbolic Act (1981), the political unconscious draws on and adapts Freud's notion of wish-fulfillment and L évi-Strauss's notion of the savage mind (' pens é e sauvage ') to construct the hypothesis that artistic works can be seen as symbolic solutions to real but unconsciously felt social and cultural problems.
